All the flowers are mentioned in Shakespeare's play. The red robin may represent passion, blood and matyrdom...

Roses: Ophelia was called 'rose of May' by her own borther Laertes.

Nettles(orties) may refer to pain and fritillaries to sorrow.

The willow and daisy are associated pain, and innocence.

Pansies (pensées)refer to love in vain.

**Violets** in a chain around her neck, stand for= represent

faithfulness(fidèlité), chastity or death.

**Poppies** (poppy=coquelicot) signify death and/or sleep.

Forget-me-nots (myosotis) float in the water.

Millais wrote to Thomas Combe in March 1852:

'Today I have purchased(£) a really splendid lady's ancient dress - all flowered over in silver embroidery - and I am going to paint it for "Ophelia". You may imagine it is something rather good when I tell you it cost me, old and dirty as it is, four pounds'  $(J.G.\ Millais\ I,\ p.162)$ .

She died two years after getting married to Gabriel Dante Rossetti


