At Wellington zoo in the North Island, animal care manager Joanne Thomas said curious animals such as otters and meerkats were keenly aware of the absence of visitors, and dingos had been taken to visit other zoo animals to keep them busy. "We do believe it is as engaging for the animals as it is for the visitors when the two interact," Thomas said. "Otters for example can be

very interactive with our visitors. Now we are seeing them focus much more on the keepers than they usually do." Under the country's level 4 restrictions, zookeepers are classed as an essential service, and allowed to continue working.
