Houseparty, WhatsApp, FaceTime, Skype, Teams, Zoom. During lockdown*, video-calling became part of our daily lives. We used video-calling apps to chat to family and friends, have lessons, celebrate birthdays, join* gym classes, host* quizzes (and more quizzes!) - and even go on dates*. One platform* became particularly popular: Zoom.

Zoom: the advantages

Why Zoom? Teenagers were some of first to adopt the app. "None of my mates use Facetime and Skype," says Ben, 16, from Bath – who hosts Zoom parties from his room. "We were bored of those years ago!" Zoom also has features like a filter* that makes

your skin look clearer and you can even to change your background. "I love that I can hide my messy* bedroom!" says Amy, 15.

Zoom: the idea

Also key to Zoom's success is its founder* and CEO* Eric Yuan. He was inspired when he was 18:

ZOOM SCHOOL: A teacher connects with her class on the video-calling app.

"When I was in college I regularly took a ten-hour train ride to visit my girlfriend (who is now my wife). I hated those rides and imagined other ways I could visit my girlfriend without travelling. Those daydreams eventually* became Zoom."

Zoom: the uses

It was Eric, now 50, who realised the need for Zoom for schools and offices, hospitals and homes. He immediately allowed schools in the U.S., Italy and Japan to use Zoom for free - over 90,000 schools joined.

Zoom: the negatives


Of course, not everyone is a fan. "Will we use this when Covid-19 is over?" asks journalist Simon Pitt. Many complain of feeling awkward*, embarrassed and selfconscious when on a call. And privacy is also a problem. Hackers interrupted* private video chats this is called 'Zoombombing'.

Zoom: the future

Yet the 'Zoom Boom'* is here to stay. Cambridge University says all of its lectures* will take place online until 2021. And business trips and big offices will be a thing of the past - as employees work from home. As for Ben, he is planning his next party - and is inviting his gran. "We're all Zoomers now!"

ypical teenage behaviour? Sometimes. But, it's not just human teenagers. Did you know that dogs are the same as human teens? Between the ages of 6-12 months, dogs enter adolescence. They are no longer puppies, and not yet adult dogs.

Scientists at Newcastle and Nottingham University in England studied 69 dogs1. They observed* the dogs at five months - before they started puberty - and then at eight months old. They noticed that the teenage dogs' behaviour changed:

- The dogs became more rebellious.
- They were harder to train.
- They took longer to respond to their owners.

Why? During this period, dogs' brains and hormones are changing. This makes it hard for them to control their behaviour and emotions. So teen dogs are more likely to 'misbehave*'.

And this is the sad side to this story. Teenage dogs are more likely to be sent to animal shelters* than at any other age. "Teen dogs are often rehomed because they are no longer a cute little puppy and their owners find they are more challenging* and can no longer control them," says Dr Lucy Asher, who worked on the study. But it doesn't last forever*. "The dogs are going through a phase it will pass."
