
Follow the Rabbit-Proof Fence is an Australian book by <u>Doris Pilkington</u>, published in 1996. Based on a true story, the book is a personal account of an <u>indigenous Australian</u> family's experiences as members of the <u>Stolen Generation</u> - the forced removal of mixed-race children from their families during the early 20th century. It tells the story of three young <u>Aboriginal girls</u>: <u>Molly</u>, 14 years old (the author's mother), Daisy (Molly's sister), and their cousin Gracie, who are forcibly removed from their families, later escape from a government settlement <u>in 1931</u>, and then trek over 1,500 miles home by following the <u>rabbit-proof fence</u>, a massive <u>pest-exclusion fence</u> which crossed Western Australia from north to south.




